Don Zurfluh's Fall Bear Hunt 2016

I left home at 6 am on Wednesday, the opening day of bear season. I arrived in the town of Gliden in Ashland county, for the evening hunt. I met **Al Schoch**, my guide, at the motel and two hours later we were on our way to the woods.

Wayne Kruger sent the Adaptive Sportsmen's chair lift and made arrangements to have a track chair for me to use. The track chair was extremely nice. I drove the chair one quarter of a mile through mud and water puddles with no problem. I backed into the chair lift and up I went into the stand. I have been paralyzed for 42 years and that was the first time I have hunted off the ground in my life. The view was wonderful.

Al said he would come to get me at dark. I sat for about three hours and one small bear came to the bait but that was all. The next morning I was in the chair lift by 5 am, but no bear. On Friday morning I went back to the same stand but nothing showed up. Al and I went for breakfast and Al said he had another place for me to hunt for that evening.

Around 3 pm we took the track chair to a three sided wooden blind. Not more than fifteen minutes into the hunt, a bear stepped out, smelled the bait then went back into the brush. It was quiet for the next two hours until a large bear suddenly walked up to the bait. The bear began eating as a sow with two cubs also arrived at the bait. The first bear raised his nose into the air, turned and started walking straight towards me. I was waiting for him to turn so I could have a broadside shot. He just kept coming straight towards me. By then my heart was racing, I thought I had better shoot now before he is on my lap. With the bear at 15 yards, I pulled trigger on my 30-06 and the bear took off into the brush. Second later I heard him go down. I called Al and soon he arrived with two guys to help in the recovery. They had trouble dragging the bear so we decided to tie the rope on the track chair. Amazingly the chair pulled the 300 pound bear all way to the truck.

I shot this bear (shown on photo next page) on the second day of the 2016 Wisconsin bear hunting season. Using a Mathews HTR no-cam bow and Muzzy 3-blade broadheads I put an arrow through his lungs from 17 yards away. The bear traveled about 150 yards before we found him. The bear made the Pope & Young record book with a score of 19 11/16. He is also registered with the Wisconsin Buck and Bear Club. This is the 3rd bear I've taken with a bow and arrow. All 3 of these bear where taken in Ashland county using a Mathews bow shot by Rick Oldenburg. The bear rug I had made from this trophy is now hanging in my home and measurers 6'9" from the tip of the nose to the base of the tail. Rick Ohldenberg

Wild Boar Hunt-North Star Gameland

From December 9-11, 2016, long time ASI guide Bill Stuber led a group of about 25 hunters/guides on a weekend Wild Boar hunt at North Star Gameland in Montour, Iowa. North Star is a 750 acre hunting preserve located west of Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Most people stayed in the two on-site cabins; however, they are not wheelchair accessible, so I stayed in the Comfort Inn in nearby Marshalltown, Iowa. North Stars owner, Terry graciously let us use his heated garage as a base for breakfast, lunch and dinners. Bill supplied the food, and most people brought goodies to contribute to the potluck meals. The Friday morning hunt started around 0530, with hunters using 4-wheelers, a tracked wheelchair and trailers to get to their stands. Terry took my guide Dave Fitzsimmons and I to my stand using his John Deere tractor with a trailer over a dike pond trail-definitely my most challenging ride to a stand, even though I was strapped to trailer, and Dave was holding me in place. I hunted from a pop-up blind behind a huge fallen tree which provided some cover. We saw boar, but not in shooting range. We also saw rams and some nice whitetail bucks. After heading back to the garage for a quick lunch and warmup, we headed back out to the blind. Several hunters, including my sons Conor and Rory were stalk hunting boar and rams. Conor and Rory each got a boar, while Dave and I patiently waited till dark until we heard a boar running towards us. The boar stopped to look back and feed, and I was able to harvest him with my crossbow. Several of us left Saturday morning just ahead of a snow storm, so I didn't get to hear all the stories, but 16 boar and 2 rams were harvested over the weekend. Big thanks to Bill Stuber for organizing, North Star for hosting us, and all the guides who helped us get into the woods for a memorable experience.
