Member Spotlight

John Martinson is a familiar name to most of the people in Adaptive Sportsmen, he is a member of the Board and the coordinator of the Madison Fishery. It will come as no surprise to those who know him to hear that he purchased a Wilcraft ice fishing machine (shown above) this winter. The Wilcraft machine is an atv type of machine designed to get out on the ice safely and easily. It has a boat style body for safety and a rear wheel drive atv style propulsion unit. The back of the machine lowers via electrical actuators to make it easy for a paraplegic like John to get into the machine.

John has used this vehicle this winter for ice fishing and I am sure he will show it to any interested members during the course of the year. The Wilcraft line of machines (info at www.thewilcraft.com) is the type of equipment that raises the interest of many of our members and will make it easier for all of us to get back to doing the sports we have enjoyed in the past. Adaptive Cross Country Sit Skis Available

This is a call to any park with cross country ski trails looking to offer a unique form of winter recreation to people with disabilities. The University of Wisconsin – Madison engineering program has been developing a simple yet state-of-the-art design for cross country skiing adapted for individuals with mobility impairments. They have over 100 of them made and are offering to borrow up to two to each interested state park at no cost.

Below is a picture of Jane Schmieding at Governor Nelson State Park using one of the sit skis. Jane has MS which restricts her ability to walk independently and, therefore, ski using traditional methods. As you can see, all of the movement is generated through the arms so flatter trails are preferred for obvious reasons.

Winter in Wisconsin is a difficult time for many people with disabilities, not only to enjoy the outdoors, but to complete simple tasks outside of the home due to snow. This is an amazing opportunity that can be offered at your park to get more people outdoors. We all know what the winter blues can be like!

Clintonville Hunt Story.

The Clintonville Area Bowhunt date for 2010 will be October 14-17 This is a small, quaint hunt based out of the **Christus Lutheran Camp** near Highway 45 and the town of Marion. The lodge at the camp is on 40 acres but there are another 160 acres to hunt on. The accessible lodge consists of a breezeway, day room with long tables, wood burning fireplace, 2 large sleeping quarter rooms with six sets of bunk beds in each, a large kitchen and 2 large accessible restrooms with showers.

The 40 acres consists of trails, open field areas, pines and brushy hardwoods. The 160 acres are owned by the Clintonville Area School District, the Town of Larabee and a sliver of DNR land. A portion of this land is along the Pigeon River.

This hunt is designed to accommodate up to six hunters along with a guide or assistant for each. **New this year will be the allowance of the helper or guide to hunt but they will need to be close enough to the hunter to assist at any time.** There are more blinds set, than hunters attending so a change of scenery is easily accomplished. Some choose to hunt hard and others will sleep in or adjust their schedule to the weather. Scouting in advance can be done but will need to be in coordination with the hunt organizers. The hunt organizers are willing to set up the type of hunt you prefer for example baiting versus runway hunting or near agriculture fields or river bottoms.

The smaller number of people at this hunt allows most of the meals to be tailored to your schedule. The wood is provided for the ever burning fireplace and is a great place to take the chill off after hunting. The people who have attended this hunt have commented that they enjoyed the relaxed nature of the hunt and the delicious meals. At night there are card games, board games and of course, story telling,
