

Special Spring Bear Hunt

In early February we were made aware of a late cancellation at Wekusko Falls Lodge https://wekuskofallslodge.com. We saw this as a possibly once in a lifetime opportunity for Adaptive Sportsman, **Michael Willms**, his brother-in-law, **Brandon Ringwolski** and myself, his dad **Tim Willms**. What are the odds that 3 spring bear hunts opened up, this lodge generally has a 3-4 year wait list for their hunts. We quickly called and booked our spots for the late May hunt.

Wekusko falls offers great accommodations and not only the opportunity for the bear hunt, but world class walleye and pike fishing. The family and staff that run the lodge could not have been more accommodating of our additional needs. They offer tree stands and ground stands. The staff was very helpful getting us to the stands and set up to hunt utilizing trucks and 4 wheeler transportation to the stands.

Michael and I hunt together because of his special needs. They set us up in a 2 person stand on our first day at the lodge. Being so far north the sun sets after 10 PM so heading out to the stands between 3 and 4 was the norm. Michael and I rode with a guide and the lodge owner on quads to a 2 person ladder stand set-up about 30 yards from a bait. On the way in, the owner told me a nice bear had been hitting this bait daily for the last several days. After resetting the bait and getting us set up in the stand the guides drove away on their quads. We could still hear the quads in the distance. I was setting up my gear in the stand and Michael nudged me to look at the bear already on the bait. We watched the bear for about 10 minutes, identified it as a boar and of a nice size. I told Mike that if he was ready, it was a shooter. Mike took aim, slowly squeezed off his shot and the bear went down about 20 feet from the bait. We had been in the stand less than 20 minutes and had a bear down. I used the walkie to inform the guides bear down. They thought it was a mistake as they were still on the quads, not even back to the truck yet and didn't hear the shot. While waiting for the guides to set up the other hunters before coming back to retrieve our harvest, we had 3 other bears come to the bait.

When the guides returned for us to get down and see the bear close up it was a nice 6' 239# spring bear. A single shot placed on target meant for a successful hunt. That was the last of my hunting with Mike, as he had his bear, he spent the rest of the week fishing for walleye and pike.

Brandon and I had seen multiple bears over the next couple of days. On day 3 of the hunt I was successful in taking my bear. After a very short sit, I had a small bear come in to the bait shortly after, a larger one ran him off. The larger one was my opportunity, and like Mike in one shot, the bear went down shortly after hit. Mine was smaller 5'4" and 149#. All we had left for the trifecta was Brandon to get one with his bow. On day 5 Brandon was successful as well. We were all ecstatic. Brandon's bear was 5'3" and 139#. Of the 8 hunters in camp that week, Michael held the title of biggest bear until the 3rd week of hunts when 3 over 6" were finally taken.

After each of us successfully bagged our bears, we spent the remaining days doing lots of fishing and eating fresh walleye. I had the biggest pike of the week at 42" and we had multiple walleye over 25" in the boat. As it turned out, I believe this was a once in a lifetime hunt for me and my boys, 3 for 3 bears and a great week of fishing all rolled into the same week.
