The Wheel Turns.

I believe we all have stories about teaching our kids and younger relatives to learn the joys of the outdoors and the reasons we find hunting so rewarding. I had this experience with my nephew when he was growing up. I never expected that it would turn out to be such a lasting bond between us.

Gavin, my nephew, was 10 years old when he began spending summers with my wife and me. He lived in Oklahoma with his single-parent mother. We offered to have him come up and spend the summer to give her a break from parenting, school, and work. It was inevitible that we would spend time talking about hunting and shooting sports, and we decided together that he would go hunting with me and my friends when he was old enough. For the next 15 years he came up from Oklahoma every summer and every November to hunt with us during the gun deer season. Some years the November logistics were tough. I am not sure his mother really appreciated the importance that Wisconsin hunters put on "Opening Day", but somehow we made it happen.

The first year was frigid, with temperatures near zero on opening weekend. I never saw a kid shiver so much and still refuse to stop hunting with his "Uncle Al". He was rewarded later in the week when the weather got warmer and a doe and nubby buck ran past him. He wasn't fast enough for the doe but he got a shot at the nubby and he had his first deer!

Fast forward 2002. I had leased a Quality Deer Management plot near Lacrosse and Gavin took off early from his freshman year in college to help set up. I was now in a wheelchair from a hunting accident in 1998 and our hunting was more of a mutual effort. Opening day that year was mild, with little snow cover. He had a tree stand about 150 yards from the ground stand I set up for my ATV. About 7:15 that morning a big buck came through the woods and I could tell he was going to pass in front of me about 60 yards away. I got my gun ready to shoot as he walked towards an opening where I would have a good shot. But then I heard a Bang, sure enough, Gavin had seen the same deer and shot it before it could get to me. It was a nice 8 pointer that scored about 130 points, his first trophy buck. I always teased him after that about shooting "my buck".

Time passed, Gavin graduated, got married, has a young son, but we always talked about going hunting together again, Last year he invited me to go down to Texas and hunt at his deer camp, just like old times. Of course this time he was in charge, it was his friend's deer camp and I was the guest. He made a Texas style deer stand in an area called the "Interstate" because of the numbers of deer that would pass the stand. A couple of days of hunting later I saw a buck that I thought was big enough, took my shot and he fell after running about 75 yards. My first Texas buck and second trophy in my hunting career. When Gavin came told me he had shot a big one too. Mine was about 120 points, but it was a baby compared to his, which scored over 140.

I went down again this year hoping to get another chance at one of those big deer Gavin kept talking about. I had the same stand at the Interstate, and got in early on Friday of the Texas gun deer opener so we decided we would go out that night. I was there about 90 minutes when deer started coming in. There was about six deer around the feeder in The weather forecast called for rain throughout the scheduled hunt so the field when my big buck showed up across the field. He slowly walked across the uneven ground crossing from my left towards the feeder that was 140 yards in front of me. It was the longest walk, it seemed like it took forever. I got several good looks at him through my binoculars and I knew he was one of the big ones that Gavin was talking about. He got to the feeder and kept walking around the does, never giving me a clean shot that wouldn't hit a doe also. Then I was supprised as a horse wandered in and made it harder to get an open shot. Finally he stepped out from the crowd. I had a clean shot where we have booths will be on the Web page calendar. You can also contact and took it. He jumped, turned to my right and ran about 70 yards and stopped. He stood there, kind of hunched up, I knew I had hit him good but he wouldn't go down. After about 5 minutes I took another shot and he went down. I waited for Gavin to come get me. knowing he would be proud that he was able to help his Uncle Al get the trophy deer he always talked about. Gavin finally came and we picked up the deer, it was an 11 pointer.

> My deer was the talk of deer camp, several people had seen him during bow hunting and he was on the trail cams, but no one had gotten a shot at him. We guessed he was about 160 points. The taxidermist measured him at 156 about a week later. So I guess I can never tease Gavin about taking my buck anymore, since he has returned the favor may times over since then. I find that when you give freely you always get more back, and my experience with my nephew Gavin proves that to me. I hope that all of us can experience the joys of the outdoors, hunting, and the true joy of giving our help and friendship to friends, family, and all those we meet along the way.

The dogs got on it quickly the bear went thru several river bottoms, hardwoods, and a swamp before they had it up a tree. This took 3 hours maybe a little more. During the chase I saw the bear cross the road with the dogs 300 yards behind. Got back to the tree it was only 40 to 50 yards from a road. Someone up there must have been looking out for me. The bear was up, and I say again up this very big, tall tree in thick branches. It took 30 minutes to keep going around the tree so the bear would move to get a shot. Good thing it did not come down. Everything came out smoothly. I shot twice and the bear fell out of the tree. The gentleman with the dogs handled the chore of gutting it and dragging it out to the car. This sounds like a dream, but it was a dream that came true. I again thanks to everyone for making this possible. Sincerely Darwin Swille

Kansas Deer Hunt

I had the opportunity to join some great friends on a December whitetail hunt on a lease near Stanford, Kansas. This was my third year trying to bag a trophy Kansas whitetail where the first year I did not draw a tag and last year tagged a doe after not getting a chance on any mature bucks. This year was different for me as I have accepted and adapted to hunting differently due to my progressing ALS. Using my Action Trackchair with a gun rest, I was able to comfortably drive into and hunt out of my Barronett Pentagon hub blind with garage door entry. By the evening of day 3, we had seen many deer and passed on 13 younger bucks before pulling the trigger on a nice doe. Thirty minutes later a mature 8 pointer stepped out and I took the shot. After trailing a short distance, we lost the trail and decided to resume in the morning with a tracking dog. The dog made quick work of the 394 yard trail to find what remained after the coyotes enjoyed their meal. Fortunately, I was able to salvage the head for a European mount of my new personal best. It was an awesome experience that created great memories with my best friends. Scored 139 inches with 16 inch spread. Other friend harvested a nice 9 pointer as well. Steve Berg
